From the Vestry

The Vestry met on April 20th for housekeeping and decision making purposed. The official letter of separation was signed. The letter outlines the Diocesan rules for the do's and don'ts for future communications and relationships with Mother Beverly. While the letter will be distributed via regular mail, it is also being included here below:

Dearly Beloved,

I write to you today on behalf of the Vestry to update you on the final details of Mother Beverly's departure. On April 20, 2022 the Vestry met to review and sign *The Letter of Leaving*. The following is a synopsis of the letter:

- Effective April 30, 2022, Mother Beverly will no longer be responsible for priestly, pastoral and administrative duties for The Church of the Nativity. It is customary that the Congregation and Mother Beverly observe a time of separation to discover who they are now, where they want to go and with what leadership.
- The Vestry will make provisions for interim pastoral and priestly ministry for the congregation. At this time, we have secured the services of supply priests in the Diocese to preside during Sunday services. On those Sunday's we do not have a priest to preside over the Eucharist we will have Morning Prayer.
- Mother Beverly agrees not to officiate or assist at any baptism, wedding or funeral in the Parish. There is one exception approved by the Bishop for June 19, 2022.
- It is further agreed that if Mother Beverly attends the congregation in the future that it will be only at the invitation of the current Rector, at that time

she will not engage any uncomplimentary or critical remarks concerning the church staff or leadership when in social or other gatherings.

- If after a year of the arrival of a new Rector/ Priest- in Charge there is a desire to review and renegotiate the details of *The Letter of Leaving*, The Rector in consultation with the vestry and the willingness of the former Rector will contact the Bishop to obtain permission to make any revisions.

It is with a heavy heart and profound gratitude that will say farewell to Mother Beverly. She guided this congregation with great skill, compassion and love during a time of many challenges. We will now - ***Go in peace to love and serve the Lord. Thanks be to God.*** In Him, Aaron +

The Food Pantry

Did you know that almost 45,000 people in the LC Valley experience food insecurity? According to the Idaho Food Bank (2022) that is 11.2% of the population of the region. I have discovered that I can provide you with some concrete information about the numbers of individuals and families that were served on a monthly basis. While it is historic (March 2022). I think it's an eye opener on how much of a difference this service can make.

In March 2022, 491 individuals sought food stuffs from the Pantry; 113 were children between the ages of 0-17; 185 were between the ages of 18-59 and there were 193 participants were over the age of 60. No family or person that arrived at the pantry was turned away, there were 29 new families and 58 returning families.

It is this context that I invite you to keep the hungry and the food pantry crew in your hearts and prayers.

From your Messenger

When I began my graduate studies at Eastern Washington University (EWU) in 1993, I didn't really know what group of people I wanted to work with. Generally speaking most social work students are pretty clear about that for themselves. People either want to work with kids and or do therapy and that is so fine, the world needs social workers who can do that kind of specialty work. I did know the groups of people that I didn't feel compelled to work with, so with this knowledge as a process of elimination and allowing for more spiritual discernment, I found my path directly and very naturally working with the elderly.

I interned in an Adult Day Health program and in community mental health in Spokane. This practical experience and my love of life and stories paved the way for work in nursing homes, with veterans and finally in-home health and hospice. I think you all know that not every vet or person in a nursing home, or in need of end of life care is elderly, but it is this context of my background that I share with you so that you have some framework for my ongoing messaging about taking care of yourselves as you age. Not to mention that I am right there with you being in my 60s now.

In my 20+ years as a clinical social worker and raising three children as a single parent, I never found a lot of time to volunteer for something that wasn't directly related to the enrichment of the lives of my children, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, sports teams. Now that I am older, and the kids are all (6) adults with lives of their own, I have made a commitment to volunteer for something that is important and meaningful to me.

Last October I applied for and was accepted on the Aging and Long-Term Care; Asotin County Council. It is the sweetest of opportunities for me because it allows me to participate in serving the elderly at a whole different level than in the past. The commitment is an intersection of service, policy, advocacy, education and outreach.

In that framework, I wanted to get the word out to you all (those of you where are 60+ anyway, that May is **Older Americans Month**. This year the theme is **AGE MY WAY- 2022**. The Older Americans Act (OAA) was passed in 1965 under Johnson and has been reauthorized and funding regularly since that time, most recently in 2020. The OAA is in place to provide an administrative structure for each state to establish programs and services with the goal to keep people in their homes for as long as possible. The OAA authorizes funding for training, research and demonstration projects in the field of aging as well as grants for services.

One program, that is likely to be seen in many states, is Nutrition Programming, congregate meals, meals on wheels that sort of thing, after more than two years of having dining in suspended, because of COVID, in Washington this month most congregate meal sites have re-opened for seated dining. In Idaho, meals sites are open and some centers are able to provide transportation. In home respite care is also a program that if a family is not on Medicaid, they may qualify for that support service.

Because each state decides what to do with their OAA grant funds, what is available in one state may not be in another, an example of this, is the Foot Surveillance program in Washington- this is the program that Aaron contracts with to do foot care. This state determined service, that Idaho does not fund as part of the Aging and Long - Term Care services offered. is why some people in the LC Valley are eligible for foot care and others may need to pay privately.

In any case, the Month of May is Older Americans Month and the OAA does offer support programs in every state, in Lewiston the Community Action Partnership houses the services and information about what is going on here> [Community Action Partnership](#), and in Asotin County [Age My Way Asotin County](#).

In closing I wanted to share this information related to Cyber Security :

- In February State Aging and Long-Term Care Council hosted Pat Johnson and Jean Matheson and Dave Moro, AARP Volunteers, who discussed the importance of Cyber security and Fraud Awareness

Some of the points to consider:

- Charity Fraud based on current world events (fraudsters are great readers of emotions)
- Romance Scams have exploded during COVID
- Fake on-line sales sites like pretend Amazon or others that end up with a link to financial accounts

Recommendations for protecting your cyber life:

- Use Strong Passwords

Password Managers applications to safely store the many passwords for your multiple accounts such as: Dashlane, One Password for example.

- The speaker suggested the Master Password for your password keeper be the first letters of a password phrase ex: One eyed. One horned, flying purple people eater becomes a master password of oeohfppe but it should be a bit longer.
- Avoid using public Wi-Fi with any financial action

- Designate one credit card for internet purchases
- Check credit weekly at www.annualcreditreport.com
- Limit or eliminate debit cards and never use the debit card for online purchases

The 5 Ps used by Bad Actors by phone:

1. Pretend to be from a known authority or entity like the courts, or social security
2. Prizes offered
3. Pressure - Time pressure
4. Pay in a specific way like gift cards
5. The 5th P is Hang UP

COVID 19/Delta/Omicron/BA.2 Information and Resources

The COVID virus continues to mutate and inform our lives and movements. The recently there was a new variant BA.2 reminds us that we still need to be mindful of public health practices, the virus will at some point be endemic. While the recommendations in Idaho are standard, stay home to quarantine if you are symptomatic, masks remain optional. On April 15, 2022 Governor Little is lifting the state of emergency across the State of Idaho.

Washington mask mandates were lifted in March; in most settings but mandates remain for most health care spaces. Dr. Scott Lindquist, MD, MPH, Washington State Epidemiologist for Communicable Diseases, DOH. Ongoing recommendations to decrease risk factors:

1. Optimizing vaccine status
2. Respiratory Protection (wearing masks)
3. Social Distancing
4. Testing
5. Improved ventilation that maximizes airflow
6. Consider smaller gatherings
7. Testing prior to gathering in small groups
