



I don't really know where to start with my writings about Mary Lou Gregory. Her life is so full and it sounds like it always has been. She left her Centralia Washington home when she was 18. She moved to Seattle to work and go to school. She trained as a nurse and worked as a nurse for 20 years, but worked in her life doing other things- she worked in a deli, and the US Census Bureau, she worked in banks and offices. Clearly, she is a woman of many talents.

Mary Lou has lived in the Lewis Clark Valley since 1976 and is a constant presence in the community. She has been part of the Church of the Nativity since 1979. She characterizes herself as a people person which is likely the reason she is committed to a life of service and volunteering –at the Church she serves on several committees, Saturday suppers, the food pantry and the Guild. In the community she volunteers

transportation with at least one 98 year old woman in the Valley. Mary Lou loves to sing, and is in the choir, she also sings at community events and funerals when asked. She has been married twice, her second husband to whom she was married for 25 years filled her life with three children Roger, Susan, Rex and Ryan, and this naturally means that she has so many grands and great grands she doesn't know what to do. Additionally, Mary Lou shared about her beloved and ornery cat Stormy, he is 14 and is a Master of Cattitude.



It should come as no surprise to any of us that Mary Lou has a heart and passion for cooking and baking. She fondly recalls learning to master the cherry pie at a time in her life when she has a cherry tree growing outside a window of the home she lived in. Several years ago, she shared her cherry pie recipe with the Golden Times Section of the Lewiston Tribune. When I asked her what people would be surprised if they knew about her she reported to me that while she did not know either personally, she was at the University of Washington at the same as Kenny G. and Jean Smart. Thank you, for your precious time Mary Lou, ~Luella

Because of her love of food and her personal life philosophy, *'a good bowl of soup is a spiritual experience'* she has shared the following recipe with us. The recipe is adapted from the 1st Ed of the Betty Crocker Picture Cookbook:

Mary Lou's Clam Chowder

¼ cup finely chopped bacon

¼ cup minced onion

Slowly sauté bacon in kettle, add onion and cook until yellow

Add juice from 2 iced potatoes

½ cup boiling

Cook until potatoes are soft, about 10 minutes

Add the clams- 2 cans drained

2 cups of milk

salt and pepper to taste

This recipe can be started at home and then taken to any gathering, church, potluck or meeting. If you to start the prep at home take the kettle with bacon, onion, clam juice potatoes and in separate containers the clams and milk to add when you get there. From home or alternative destination, after you combine the clams, milk and salt and pepper- Heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Should serve 6. For a larger party, double or quadruple ingredients as needed. Serve with crackers or bread of your choice and enjoy!

From your Messenger

Hello all- please note that I will be taking a hiatus for the Summer. I plan on returning to you here as the messenger for a September issue. This means that as you look to the fall and anything that you want to have included in the September 2022 Messenger that you will want to get that submitted to me by the 15th of August. You will see me in Church and all of my usual comings and goings however so I look forward to seeing you all. For now though I want to share with you some points of interest that came up at the Recent Aging and Long Term Care Council meeting as it relates to protecting yourself, your money, assets and identity. I know I have talked about this before but there was a presentation at the most recent meeting and I wanted to share some of the information that was presented by the AARP. Did you know that according to the Federal Trade Commission, 16.7 million people from across the country were victimized and fleeced of up to 17 Million dollars. One of the biggest protective factors for us to fight these crimes is to stay vigilant. Ways that you may be at risk for being victimized:

- **Phishing-** don't get hooked. Never ever give your **bank information** or **social security number, birthdate** to someone over email, text or the phone
- **Shred** -anything that has any of the items noted above. Trash can be a treasure trove for anyone who may be looking.
- **Be wary of bogus employment** “opportunities” and anything that asks for the same information highlighted.
- **Gold Coin Scam-** don't do it, high stakes swindlers pull out all the stops, TV ads, radio ads, promises of high returns, if it sounds too good to be true- it is
- **Free Lunch/Time Shares-** you are invited to a free lunch or a lovely get a way and are pressured to sign on- don't do it-
- **Gas and Oil Scams-** You are solicited by phone text or mail or email to invest in (anything really) but in this case specifically new drilling technology- don't do it.

- **Fake Checks-** You get a call, text or email that you have won a huge prize. This is a manipulative smoke and mirrors kind of grift- they send you a cashiers check that looks legit but ask you to pay for some part of the process. It isn't until after you have given them your part that you discover that the check is fake.
- **Computer Take Over-** Don't let anyone solicit you to take over your computer, if you get a popup or demand for ransom- see a legitimate computer person.
- **Disaster Relief-** Choose the programs that you want to contribute to carefully. Do not participate in anything that may be related to giving unless you have seriously checked the organization out. Disasters are a time when people are vulnerable and scammers and criminals target us to appeal to our kindness and generosity- don't fall for it.
- **Sweetheart Scams-** one of the most heartbreaking ways to steal from people, preying on the lonely- don't give your money, resources or anything to someone you meet on line- don't let your emotions guide these interactions, red flags include: can't meet face to face, only quick short notes, can't talk on the phone- just don't do it.
- **Grandchild Scam-** you get an email or a text or call from someone posing as your grandchild- they have been arrested, are in the hospital in a foreign country- it is more likely that your grandchild's information has been stolen and you are at risk for being victimized- don't panic, disengage and do your due diligence to assure that your grandchild is safe
- **When was the last time you entered a Foreign Lottery?** First, they are illegal, and second if you have not entered the lottery- there is nothing to win- thus if you are solicited to collect your winnings and the only thing you have to do is- anything?? Do not do it.

Protect yourselves and your loved ones by following the following tips from the

AARP Fraud Watch Network:

- Don't carry your Social Security (SS) card on your person
- Don't include SS# on checks or drivers license
- SS recently updated Medicare Cards with out SS#s
- Medicare will not call you to verify your SS#
- When in doubt, shred everything
- Limit the number of cards you carry
- Keep copies of your credit cards front and back in a safe place in the event that yours is lost or stolen
- Monitor your bank and financial accounts for: missing bills, unrecognized charges on your accounts
- Use e-banking if possible to reduce the risk of paper access for people who shouldn't be accessing your business
- Use pass phrases- they can be easier to remember, change your passwords regularly
- If you have a question about a possible investment "opportunity" reach out to someone who is knowledgeable.
- Monitor your credit. You are eligible for a free credit report every year- call 1-877-322-8228 or go on line to annualcreditreport.com.
- Protect your ID#s, PINS and Passwords. Don't carry them on your person, store somewhere safe, use passphrases, change passwords regularly, use different access codes for each account.
