A Note From the Organist

There seems to be some discrepancy as to what the proper etiquette is for congregants regarding the *prelude* and *postlude* (the music preceding and concluding the service on Sundays) and I thought I'd offer my two cents.

Some time ago, it was announced that the congregation should stay and be quiet during the postlude so that people can listen. While I am flattered by this show of appreciation, as far as I am concerned, the postlude has traditionally been a festive, joyful and particularly louder piece of music, meant to usher the congregants to "go in peace to love and serve the Lord," and to usher folks into fellowship with one another, carrying into Coffee Hour. However, it is entirely reasonable that folks might want to stay and appreciate the musical offering, even possibly taking time to reflect and pray after the service is finished.

The prelude, traditionally, has often been a more quiet, contemplative piece of music, meant to invite the congregants to enter into a prayerful state for worship. You will notice that many congregants, during the prelude or after they first enter the church, will kneel at the pews to begin praying and entering into the state of mind for worship. For others, this may be a time where, with joy, they greet their neighbor and maybe even converse before the ringing of the bell starts the service. This can prove distracting and harsh for those who are trying to enter into a prayerful state, but it is certainly not wrong in any book to want to greet your neighbor before worshipping and praying with them.

This all to say, there is no such thing as a definitive etiquette (in my book), and all these actions are justifiable. I will simply conclude by saying, please be mindful of those congregants around you and try to understand each other's needs. If you'd like to greet your neighbor before the service, perhaps be aware that there are those who may be trying to enter into that special place of quiet, to tune their hearts and minds toward worship. And, lastly, I do not feel that people should feel trapped during the postlude music, as if it were a

concert performance. If you would like to stay and listen, thank you! Otherwise, feel free to go with joy! But, perhaps, be mindful of those who do wish to stay and listen.

I hope that this perspective from the bench helps. There is no right or wrong answer, just the hope that we all get along together. Thank you for all of your constant, kind appreciation of the music that Sarah and I offer at Nativity.
